Francis Brings Peace at Gubbio (The Wolf)

As Francis' reputation for holiness and peace spread throughout his native Italy, people called upon him to resolve their disputes and to deliver them from danger and violence. On one such occasion, the people of the small town of Gubbio alerted Francis to the presence of a ferocious wolf in their countryside. All efforts to trap the wolf or drive him away had failed, so they called upon the Saint to intervene. He went out with only the message of the Gospel: no weapon, no sanctions, no threatening bravado. Francis met the wolf and called him to repentance for the chaos and harm that he had caused. The wolf and the townspeople agreed to live in peace; the wolf would refrain from attacks and the townspeople would feed the wolf for the rest of his life.

As is frequently the case, such pious legends often have a basis in history and scholars have long thought that this popular narrative of Francis exercising miraculous power over the world of animals has at its core a factual account of no lesser spiritual importance.

It may well be that the term "Wolf of Gubbio" signifies an epithet attached to a notorious outlaw of the period, who both raided livestock and robbed people as well. Confronted by armed villagers, the "Wolf" nonetheless prevailed, being either more skillful with weapons or more ruthless in nature.


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Francis, however, neither confronted him with arms nor threatened him by sanctions. Rather, he challenged the robber in the name of the Lord to reconcile with his victims and so to experience the peace that only Christ can bring.

Thus, the legend of the "Wolf of Gubbio" points to a more enduring dimension of Francis' historical ministry, namely, the reconciliation of all people and their reintegration into the fabric of social life through the grace of forgiveness.

Reflection - Remembering Suzanne Aubert

'The old man lay in the bed at the Home of Compassion. He had been given his morning cup of tea. As a sister walked by he threw the lot at her – cup, saucer and the tea in it! The young sister was telling Mother Aubert about the incident. She was looking for advice as to how to deal with such situations. Listening attentively, Mother Aubert thought a moment and then said – "sister, catch the cup!"'.

At the heart of Suzanne Aubert's vision was compassion – being compassionate as God is compassionate.

She also knew that 'when all human endeavours fail, that is the moment of God'. So, trusting in God, drawing on the 'courage' that St John Vianney had gifted her, she put much effort into meeting the needs of people from 'all creeds or none'.

She struggled with the Church hierarchy. She travelled great distances within Aotearoa/New Zealand, always on the "main trunk line" and to Rome – at all times practicing 'contemplation on the hop'. Suzanne shared her vision and commitment – she built a faith and belief that gathered people around her - formed relationships, networks and friendships. She established the Daughters of Our Lady of Compassion, Aotearoa/New Zealand's own religious order.

As Catholics we are familiar with imagery of the cup. At Gethsemane, just before his arrest, Jesus prayed: 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me, yet not what I want but what you want'.

At the Last Supper Jesus 'took a cup, and after giving thanks, he gave it to them, saying, drink from it, all of you'.

When life gets tough. When things don't go quite the way we thought they might. When we are hit with anger, frustration, weakness and failure, what is there to do but - '*Catch the cup*'.

Heart for Hire - (Matthew 20: 1 - 16A)

RCIA Catholics often report that they feel somehow inferior to cradle Catholics.

Having come to the church as adults, they don't share the parochial school history and enculturated Catholic memories that veteran members of the church have. In the same way, younger people in the church feel left out of the pre Vatican II store-house of comparisons that the post-conciliar crowd is always using as a reference point.

Latecomers in any arena can feel that their presence or commitment is less authentic. They don't have the battle scars to compete for acceptance.

Jesus doesn't hire by the years or the scars, happily, but by the heart. Having heard Mass in Latin doesn't make one more genuinely Catholic, and wearing a plaid uniform for eight years is not a certificate of authentic faith.

Punching the clock doesn't make us disciples, but rather answering the call. The vineyard needs labourers. The only labourers who count are the ones whose hearts are for hire, and not just their time.
