<u>Palm Sunday</u>

People in biblical times honoured the donkey.

The donkey was an animal of peace as opposed to the horse, which was an animal of war, carrying soldiers into battle.

Jesus' act of riding into Jerusalem on an animal of peace says that an important part of the

Messiah's mission would not be to rally people to their cause and drive the Romans out of Palestine into the sea.

Jesus wasn't going to be a warrior-king, to sit on a throne and be served by conquered Romans. Instead, he came to kneel on the floor and wash the feet of his disciples.

Jesus didn't come to do battle against other people. He wasn't riding on a horse.

He has come to show them by his life that the loving 'fight' is against poverty, hunger, hatred, and all forms of injustice.

Jesus hasn't come to condemn people. He has come to forgive and free them.

Jesus hasn't come to destroy people's dreams. He has come to fulfil them in the most wonderful way imaginable.

It is this Jesus whom we greet today.

Handing Ourselves Over

Holy Week is a way to practice the most holy and sacred rhythm of our faith - death, burial and resurrection. Let us enter into Jesus' passion by "handing ourselves over" to the events of this week - Mary's costly act of preparation for Jesus' burial, Jesus' final teaching regarding the cost of discipleship, the tenderness of the Last Supper, the pain of betrayal, Jesus handing himself over to his enemies in the garden of Gethsemane, the arduous journey to the cross, the despair of Holy Saturday, the joy of resurrection Sunday.

As we prepare for Holy Week, let us ask Jesus what area of our lives at this time needs to be transformed through the rhythm of death, burial and resurrection. Let us ask him to be our teacher on the way... from death to burial to resurrection life.

" It seems that we Christians have been worshipping Jesus' journey instead of doing his journey. The worshipping feels very religious and safe; the latter just feels human and ordinary. We are not human beings on a journey toward Spirit, we are already spiritual beings on a journey towards becoming human, which for some reason seems harder precisely because it is so ordinary". Holy Week



Holy Thursday (sometimes referred to as Maundy Thursday after the Latin mandatum or command to love one another, is a day when Christians commemorate the Last Supper of Jesus.

In some traditions, there is the washing of the feet of various members of the community to recall a gesture of Christ at the Last Supper when he washed the feet of his disciples. This is a sign of the need to do more to love one another and to serve all people, especially the poor.



Good Friday is a solemn day on which Christians recall the death of Jesus and its promise of hope and new life. In some traditions a wooden cross is set up and people spend time meditating before it.

Other people make the Stations of the Cross a devotion that recalls the journey of Jesus on the Via Dolorosa (Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem to Calvary where he was crucified. (In Jerusalem the place of Christ's death and resurrection is commemorated inside the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.)

Many Christians keep this devotion but also see in the suffering of Jesus a reminder to be more concerned for the suffering of people in today's world. For many Christians, this day is also a day of fasting and penance.



Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday is the greatest feast in the Christian calendar. While our society puts a major emphasis on Christmas, no other day is traditionally as sacred for the Christian community as Easter. This is the day Christians

commemorate the resurrection of Christ.

In some traditions, the services begin the night before with the lighting of a new fire and the blessing of a large Easter candle. Water is blessed and many are baptized. But for all Christians, this is a day to renew one's faith.

In the Catholic Church, there is a sprinkling of all people with the newly blessed Easter water as a sign of renewal of our baptismal commitment. In many Protestant communities, Easter is celebrated at a sunrise service early on Easter morning. Easter usually ends with festive celebrations with special foods and Easter delicacies. **Pete sm**
