Easter Sunday 9th April 2023, Year A Readings:: Acts 10:34, 37-43, Colossians 3:1-4, John 20:1-9

Reflection

In the northern hemisphere, Christians' celebration of Easter happens as the new growth and warmth of spring bursts forth, chickens hatch and baby rabbits are born. Meanwhile, in the southern hemisphere, nature speaks to us more of dying at this time.

I've been reflecting on this while recalling my earliest memories of the Easter vigil as a 9-year-old altar boy. The service mesmerised me ... the lighting and blessing of the fire outside followed by the procession of the Easter candle into the darkened church; the passing on and gradual spread of the light from the large candle to those carrying individual candles; the flickering light inexorably filling the church.

No theological formation or explanation was required as I was swept along by senses – sight and smell – overwhelmed into a moving experience of the transcendent goodness and power of our loving God palpably present: "Death where is thy sting?" (1 Corinthians 15:55) The dark and shocking memories of the brutal torture, mocking and bloody execution of Jesus giving way to the joyful recounting of the incredulous resurrection story: "Christ our light," the priest intoned as we slowly and silently processed, to which we all sang in unison, "Thanks be to God." It was liturgy at its best – something I was totally immersed in.

John O'Donohue writes a beautifully in *Anam Cara* about our need for a new and gentle light where the soul can shelter and rediscover its ancient belonging to God. He reminds us that we are children of the darkness, our body and our face formed in the darkness of our mother's womb; our birth the first journey of many from darkness into light. "Once human beings begin to search for a meaning to life," says O'Donohue, "light becomes one of the most powerful metaphors to express the eternity and depth of life."

So, even as the nights are getting colder and longer, and at the very time that the autumn rhythms speak of the importance of letting go and remind us of the natural cycle of life and death that defines all of creation, including human life, the Easter liturgies, with their focus on the light of

Christ risen, reveal the eternal presence of God walking with us; a presence that no darkness can overcome (John 1:5).

Just as the breaking dawn reveals the beauty of the world previously immersed in darkness, so the light of Christ risen illuminates the beauty that is in each of us. It's a light we cannot hide from and a light that cannot be extinguished, truly something to rejoice in and celebrate.

Christ our light – thanks be to God.


It would be good to see many families join in the walk at the conclusion of our family liturgy.

Holy Week



In some traditions, there is the washing of the feet of various members of the community to recall a gesture of Christ at the Last Supper when he washed the feet of his disciples. This is a sign of the need to do more to love one another and to serve all people, especially the poor.

Good Friday is a solemn day on which Christians recall the death of Jesus and its promise of hope and new life. In some traditions a wooden cross is set up and people spend time meditating before it.

Other people make the Stations of the Cross a devotion that recalls the journey of Jesus on the Via Dolorosa (Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem to Calvary where he was crucified. (In Jerusalem the place of Christ's death and resurrection is commemorated inside the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.)

Many Christians keep this devotion but also see in the suffering of Jesus a reminder to be more concerned for the suffering of people in today's world. For many Christians, this day is also a day of fasting and penance.



Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday is the greatest feast in the Christian calendar. While our society puts a major emphasis on Christmas, no other day is traditionally as sacred for the Christian community as Easter. This is the day Christians commemorate the resurrection of Christ.

In some traditions, the services begin the night before with the lighting of a new fire and the blessing of a large Easter candle. Water is blessed and many are baptized. But for all Christians, this is a day to renew one's faith.

In the Catholic Church, there is a sprinkling of all people with the newly blessed Easter water as a sign of renewal of our baptismal commitment. In many Protestant communities, Easter is celebrated at a sunrise service early on Easter morning. Easter usually ends with festive celebrations with special foods and Easter delicacies.

The greatest among you must behave as if he were the youngest, the leader as if he were the one who serves. — Luke 22:26

That statement is probably the simplest and most powerful definition of spiritual authority to be found in all four Gospels.

"For who is the greater, the one at table or the one who serves?" Most of us would say immediately, "The one at table." Yet Jesus says, "Yet here I am among you as one who serves" (Luke 22:27).

Jesus says, in effect,

'I'm telling you that the way of domination will not build a new world. I have come to model for you the way to be fully human which is to be divine and exercise authority as God does.'

Often the church has not even understood or even agreed with this. In much of our history we have pretty much exercised authority and imposed laws and punishments in the same way as our secular society. This is surely not Jesus' servant leadership.

As we move forward within our Parish, I would like to invite you to an evening (a couple of hours) as we begin the walk with one another as we explore a new way of being Church with others that is characterised by humility, compassion, love and listening. Servant Leadership.

Property Update

St Benedict's Church is closed and religious items are being removed so we can request the Archdiocese to provide a Deed of Deconsecration. This process will take a few months as the Council of Priests needs to consider our request and they next meet in May.

St Andrew's has continued to be used by two other religious groups. This arrangement will stop after Easter. We will then remove religious items and make a request for deconsecration.

Significant Items being removed will be stored for possible future use. Some items are being gifted to other churches or disposed of if not considered significant.

The layout of the refurbished Parish Church has always been intended as a trial. Over the last few weeks we have received feedback from Parishioners. Thank you for this. After Easter we will reflect on the current church layout and consider any changes to be trialled for the next few months.

A decision now needs to be made on the future of the Khandallah and Newlands properties. A proposal will be provided to parishioners for feedback after Easter before seeking approval from the Archdiocese on how we will proceed.
