Sixth Week Ordinary Time 13th February 2022 Year C **Readings:** Jeremiah 17:5-8, 1 Corinthians 15:12,16-20, Luke 6:17,20-26

The challenges before us.

As I stood in front of the tomb of St Francis, I reflected that "the rock and iron of Assisi challenges the marble and gold of Rome". I am mindful that this parish, like many around the world, has been exploring new ways of being parish. Just as St Francis of Assisi presented a direct challenge to the Church of his time, living new ways of being Christian, so too his namesake, Pope Francis is also calling us to be Church in different and challenging ways – including lay people taking a greater part in the leadership of the Church.

It is this that excites me about being appointed by Cardinal John Dew to the position of 'Parish Director of Mission at St Francis of Assis, Ohariu'. My task can be summarised as to work with the Leadership Formation Team and the range of ministries in providing for the pastoral care of this parish.

A little about myself: Rosa and I have been married for four years. I have three adult children and nine grandchildren. And, a great grandson coming up to one.

I have a B.A. (Hons) in Sociology, a Diploma in Pastoral Leadership, am a trained teacher, and hold qualifications in outdoor safety and adult training and education.

For the last six years I have been Lay Pastoral Leader at Wellington South. For the 32 years prior to that I was a police officer, for the last three of those inspector coordinating emergency management (including, believe it or not, pandemic planning!). I am probably better known for the 12 years as Inspector managing arms control.

We have some real pastoral challenges ahead of us. Not the least being support to each other as COVID takes hold. It's up to each and every one of us to network together to ensure the needs of all are met. In today's aospel Jesus makes it clear that the Kingdom belongs to those who labour in rock and iron, rather than those who take comfort in marble and gold. Covid Vaccine Passes Mandatory at all Masses and Liturgies

New Zealand is now in **Red** under the Covid-19 Protection framework. Everyone aged over 12 and 3 months must show a Covid MyVaccine pass when you come to a Mass or Liturgy and <u>masks are mandatory</u>. Social distancing is essential.

Under <u>**Red</u>** you will need to show your Covid Vaccine pass when you arrive. Masses will be limited to 100 people. You **will** need to book for weekend Masses and Word and Communion Liturgies.</u>

Bookings are essential as numbers are limited. To book your place please go to the Archdiocese website and register or click on the link

Please note bookings for weekend Masses open at **9.00am Wednesday** and close at **12pm Friday**.

Everyone over 12 and 3 months will need a pass. You can get a pass at <u>https://covid19.govt.nz/covid-19-vaccines/covid-19-vaccination-</u> <u>certificates/my-vaccine-pass/</u> If you don't have a computer, phone: 0800 222 478 and have your NHI number ready.

NEW STAFF IN OUR PARISH : Welcome Joe Green:

My name is Joe Green. I have been the Lay Pastoral Leader at the Catholic Parish of Wellington South since February 2016. I worked across the whole parish including its two churches and three schools.

I am on the executive of the National Dialogue. I look forward to taking up the role of Parish Director Mission, working with the Leadership Formation Team in an exciting model of Parish leadership. During 2021 we progressed a review of the parish properties in response to a request from Archbishop John in 2019. He requested the review:

"... identify how many churches the parish needs to cater for its Mass count (taking into account the availability of priests and lay pastoral leaders), and the ideal location of the church or churches. For most, if not all parishes with more than one church, this will mean reducing the number of churches in the parish. Provision for accommodation of priests is part of the review."

He also noted:

"You need to be prepared to be radical in your thinking and discernment. The theme of parish amalgamation was "A Future Full of Hope". This hopefilled future will only start to take shape when we honestly and courageously engage with and answer the many questions about our buildings."

The LFT have drafted a response for Archbishop John with consideration of the consultation we had during 2021. This draft is available <u>here</u> on the parish website and printed copies will be available in each church this weekend. Appendix 2 is also available on the website <u>here</u>.

The LFT encourage parishioners to consider the draft and think about this not from their own perspective but from a whole parish perspective. Rather that think about what we have had in the past think about what we need as a parish in the future.

Abuse in our Catholic Church:

Please be aware that what is written below may be very upsetting and trigger horrible personal memories or experiences that affected you, your family members or friends.

This past week the scale of reported, alleged abuse within the Catholic Church in Aotearoa New Zealand has become known for the first time. Extensive research undertaken by the Church at the request of the Royal Commission on Abuse in Care was completed, made public and reported. The definition of abuse included reports of sexual, physical, emotional, psychological and neglect.

The statistics are: A total of 1680 reports of abuse were made by 1122 individuals against Catholic clergy, brothers, nuns, sisters and lay people from 1950 to the present, with 592 alleged abusers named. Almost half the reported abuse involved sexual harm. The 1960s and 1970s were the decades with the most abuse reported, with 75 per cent dated before 1990. Many abuse victims will also not have yet reported what happened to them, so many more people will have been affected.

Cardinal Dew said: "These statistics on abuse in the Catholic Church are horrifying and something we are deeply ashamed of. As we continue to respond to the Royal Commission into Abuse and build a safer Church for everyone, I firmly hope that facts like these will help us to face the sad reality. The Church will learn from this and affirm its commitment to the work of safeguarding."

The awful, tragic, sad reality is that: children, young people and adults were abused and hurt in a Catholic Church setting. A setting that should have been loving, safe, life giving and positive. This abuse was the opposite of what our church stands for. Each child, youth or adult hurt and traumatised by this abuse was also part of a family, community that was also deeply affected by the abuse. Lives were ruined. Innocence tarnished, dreams for the future dashed, a relationship with God ended and many other negative life changing events resulted because of the awful abuse. The impact of abuse is devastating and lasting.

As members of the Catholic community we must face this reality. We need to continue to think deeply about it, learn about abuse and its ongoing effects and decide how and what our church communities MUST do to provide some healing for those abused. We must also prevent violence and abuse in our church in the future.

What now: In our church foyers we have printed out copies of the information provided by the Catholic Centre. The information can also be found on line <u>here</u>.

Over the next few weeks there will be informal, conversation opportunities to talk about this Report and abuse in our church.

The first will be on Wednesday 16 February in SS Peter and Pauls Church Hall following 11am Mass. This will be led by Jim Dooley.

The second will be on Thursday February 17 at 7pm in the Church Hall at SS Peter and Pauls Johnsonville. Led by Kitty McKinley and a counsellor.

The third will be on Friday 18 February, 11am at Challenge 2000 1 Wanaka Street, led by Jim Dooley. Other opportunities to discuss and pray about abuse in our Church will be held.

Kitty McKinley, who is our Parish Safeguarding person, is also talking with Pasifika, Māori and other cultural communities to work out the best way of offering conversation opportunities.

PLEASE if you need to talk or have any ideas about what St Francis of Assisi parish can do call Kitty 021491459 or the Parish Office. Or leave a written suggestion in the church foyers marked Safeguarding and Prevention of Abuse.

Also if you have suffered abuse in the care of the Church please approach the Police, the Royal Commission, the Church's agency for managing reports of abuse (the National Office for Professional Standards, or NOPS), or one of the many support groups and networks that exist for survivors or social service agencies who can meet and talk with you.

And please, please take care and be considerate of your needs and worries and those of others.
