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Easter Sunday 17th April 2022 Year C

Readings: Acts 10:34,37-43, Colossians 3:1-4, John 20:1-9

Easter Sunday

It is important that the Easter Triduum, from the Mass of the Lord's supper to the Easter Vigil is seen as 'one liturgy'. We remember that over three days Jesus launched the Kingdom of God "on earth as it is in heaven".

At the Last Supper Jesus instituted the Eucharist, the family meal we re-enact over and over as the "source and summit" of our Christian life. In John's account, by the washing of his disciples' feet Jesus demonstrates that the only ministerial authority is the authority of service.

What happened the following day, the day we call 'Good Friday' is, as one commentator puts it, "simple: though fathomless in its implications".

Crucifixion is an act of incredible abuse on every level. Jesus's last shout from the cross, "it is done", or in some translations, "it is accomplished", is the completion of his vocation.

Jesus embodies the love of God, and acts as a personal expression of that love throughout his life, and all the way to his death. He dies under the accumulated forces of evil, so that now at last the Kingdom can come to its fullness: a new power is let loose, the power of self-giving love.

Jesus's resurrection happens in and within the natural world: we believe it to be a bodily, real-world resurrection because of the testimony of those first Christians who experienced it with their eyes and ears and hands, as well as in their hearts. They shared meals with the Risen Jesus. Without the resurrection Jesus's life and words would have remained good advice, not 'good news' (gospel).

What is accomplished over those three days is nothing short of what many have called a revolution: it can actually be "on earth as it is in heaven". The last scene in the New Testament doesn't have earth going to heaven, it has heaven coming to earth!

Easter reminds us that as disciples of Jesus, we too are called to be a revolutionary people.

Holy Week

Holy Thursday (sometimes referred to as Maundy Thursday after the Latin mandatum or command to love one another, is a day when Christians commemorate the Last Supper of Jesus.

In some traditions, there is the washing of the feet of various members of the community to recall a gesture of Christ at the Last Supper when he washed the feet of his disciples. This is a sign of the need to do more to love one another and to serve all people, especially the poor.



Good Friday is a solemn day on which Christians recall the death of Jesus and its promise of hope and new life. In some traditions a wooden cross is set up and people spend time meditating before it.

Other people make the Stations of the Cross a devotion that recalls the journey of Jesus on the Via Dolorosa (Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem to Calvary where he was crucified. (In Jerusalem the place of Christ's death and resurrection is commemorated inside the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.)

Many Christians keep this devotion but also see in the suffering of Jesus a reminder to be more concerned for the suffering of people in today's world. For many Christians, this day is also a day of fasting and penance.



Easter Sunday

Easter Sunday is the greatest feast in the Christian calendar. While our society puts a major emphasis on Christmas, no other day is traditionally as sacred for the Christian community as Easter. This is the day Christians commemorate the resurrection of Christ.

In some traditions, the services begin the night before with the lighting of a new fire and the blessing of a large Easter candle. Water is blessed and many are baptized. But for all Christians, this is a day to renew one's faith.

In the Catholic Church, there is a sprinkling of all people with the newly blessed Easter water as a sign of renewal of our baptismal commitment. In many Christians communities, Easter is celebrated at a sunrise service early on Easter morning. Easter usually ends with festive celebrations with special foods and Easter delicacies. **Pete sm**

The huia feather is a revered treasure for Māori and symbolises leadership and mana, wisdom, elegance and great dignity.

The feathers from the tail of the huia were particularly prized and were worn in the hair or around the neck by both men and women.


St Brigid's Stations of the Cross Lenten Art Project
